Practice Safety

• THIS OWNER'S MANUAL SHOULD BE READ COMPLETELY BEFORE ATTEMPTING TO DRIVE OR SERVICE THE VEHICLE. FAILURE TO FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS IN THIS MANUAL COULD RESULT IN PROPERTY DAMAGE, SEVERE PERSONAL INJURY, OR DEATH.

It is important to note that some vital statements throughout this manual and on the decals affixed to the vehicle are preceded by the words **DANGER, WARNING, CAUTION,** or **NOTE.** For your protection, we recommend that you take special notice of these safety procedures. Safety procedures are essential and must be followed.

Any operating or warning decals on the vehicle that are damaged, have been removed or cannot be easily read should be replaced immediately to avoid possible personal injury, property damage, or death. Contact your CLUB CAR distributor/dealer.

A WARNING

ELECTRIC VEHICLES ONLY:

- TO AVOID UNINTENTIONALLY STARTING THE VEHICLE, DISCONNECT THE BATTERIES AS SHOWN (SEE FIGURES 1 AND 2) AND DISCHARGE THE CONTROLLER AS FOLLOWS:
 - TURN THE KEY SWITCH TO **ON** AND PLACE THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE IN THE **REVERSE** POSITION.
 - DEPRESS THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL AND KEEP IT DEPRESSED UNTIL THE REVERSE WARNING BUZZER CAN NO LONGER BE HEARD. WHEN THE BUZZER STOPS SOUNDING, THE CONTROLLER IS DISCHARGED.

MODEL IDENTIFICATION

The serial number of your transportation vehicle is printed on a bar code decal mounted on the frame directly above the accelerator pedal (Example: J9801-123456 for Electric or JG9801-123456 for Gasoline) (Figure 3). There is also a second serial number decal mounted on the front body frame behind the center dash panel. The center dash panel must be removed to access this serial number.

NOTE

• ALWAYS HAVE THE VEHICLE SERIAL NUMBER AT HAND WHEN ORDERING PARTS OR MAK-ING INQUIRIES. **SEE FIGURE 3**.

PRE-OPERATION CHECKLIST

Your transportation vehicle has been thoroughly inspected and adjusted at the factory and by your CLUB CAR distributor/dealer. However, upon receiving your new transportation vehicle(s), you should become familiar with its controls and operation. Carefully inspect each vehicle to be satisfied that it is in proper working condition before accepting delivery. Use the following checklist as a guide to inspect your new vehicle. This same checklist should also be used in conjunction with the Periodic Service Schedules, pages 37 through 41. Any problems should be corrected by your CLUB CAR distributor/dealer or a trained technician only.

- **General:** All the parts should be in place and properly installed. Be sure that all nuts, bolts, and screws are tight. On gasoline vehicles, check all hose clamps for tight fit as well as the starter belt for tightness.
- Warning Decals: Check to ensure that all warning and operation decals are in place (See Pages 4 through 14).
- Tires: Check for proper tire pressure (See Tire Capacities, Page 44).
- Batteries (electric vehicle): Before using vehicle for the first time check electrolyte to ensure it is at the proper level (Figure 32, Page 47). Check battery posts. Wires should be tight and free of corrosion and batteries should be fully charged.
- Multi-Step Potentiometer (Electric Tourall Only): Be sure potentiometer (wiper switch) cover is properly secured prior to operating the vehicle.
- Engine (gasoline vehicle): Check for proper engine oil level (See Engine Oil, Page 45).
- Fuel (gasoline vehicle): Check fuel level (See Fueling Instructions, Page 45).

WARNING

• BE SURE THE PLASTIC HAS BEEN REMOVED FROM THE SEAT BOTTOM BEFORE OPERAT-ING THE VEHICLE. FAILURE TO DO SO MAY RESULT IN FIRE, PROPERTY DAMAGE, PER-SONAL INJURY, OR DEATH.

PERFORMANCE INSPECTION

After you have familiarized yourself with the vehicle controls and have read and understood the driving instructions, take the vehicle for a test drive. Use the following checklist as a guide to inspect your new vehicle. Any problems should be corrected only by your CLUB CAR distributor/dealer or a trained technician.

All vehicles:

- **Brakes:** Be sure the brakes function properly. When brake pedal is fully depressed under moderate pressure, it should *not* go more than halfway to the floor, and vehicle should come to a smooth, straight stop. Tourall vehicles should stop within 14 feet. Trans-Porter/Trans-Sender and Resort Villager vehicles should stop within 16 feet. If the brake pedal goes more than halfway to the floor or if the vehicle swerves or fails to stop within the appropriate braking distance for your vehicle (see preceding sentences), have the brake system checked and adjusted as required. Brake adjustment must be maintained so that the brake pedal *cannot* be depressed to the floor under any circumstances.
- **Park Brake:** When latched, the park brake should lock the wheels and hold the vehicle stationary (on incline of 20% or less). It should release when either the accelerator or brake pedal is depressed.
- Reverse Buzzer: The reverse buzzer should sound as a warning when vehicle is in reverse.
- Steering: The vehicle should be easy to steer and should not have any play in the steering wheel.
- Accelerator:

Electric Trans-Porter/Trans-Sender, Electric Resort Villager, Gasoline and Electric Tourall vehicles: As the accelerator pedal is depressed, the engine or motor should start and the vehicle should accelerate smoothly to full speed. When the pedal is released it should return to the original position and the engine or motor should stop. Both the electric and gasoline vehicles should run at a reduced speed when in reverse.

Gasoline powered Trans-Porter/Trans-Sender and Resort Villager vehicles: After starting the engine, the vehicle should accelerate smoothly to full speed as the accelerator pedal is depressed. When the accelerator pedal is released it should return to the original position and the engine should idle.

- Governor (gasoline vehicles): Check maximum speed of the vehicle. All electric vehicles and the gasoline powered Tourall should run at 12-15 mph (19-24 kph) on a level surface. The Trans-Porter/ Trans-Sender and Resort Villager gasoline powered vehicles should run at 14-16 mph (23-26 kph) on a level surface.
- **General:** Listen for any unusual noises such as squeaks or rattles. Check the vehicle ride and performance. Have a CLUB CAR distributor/dealer or a trained mechanic investigate anything unusual.
- Tourall Electric Vehicles with PowerDrive Plus (Motor Braking):
- Zero Speed Detect: With the vehicle parked on level ground, the Forward/Reverse handle in any position and the park brake disengaged, place the tow switch in the RUN position and attempt to push the vehicle. It should resist rolling (moving at no more than 1 or 2 mph). A warning buzzer should sound two seconds after the vehicle begins to move.
- **Pedal Up Motor Braking:** Accelerate the vehicle to full speed and release the accelerator pedal. Motor braking should quickly and smoothly slow the vehicle to approximately 9 mph. Motor braking will disengage when vehicle slows to 9 mph.
- **Pedal Down Motor Braking:** Accelerate down an incline with the accelerator pedal depressed. When the vehicle reaches approximately 15 mph, motor braking should engage and moderate vehicle speed between 15 and 16 mph, depending on the grade of the hill.

CONTROLS - TRANS-PORTER/TRANS-SENDER ELECTRIC, RESORT VILLAGER ELECTRIC, TOURALL GASOLINE, AND TOURALL ELECTRIC VEHICLES:

A DANGER

• DO NOT OPERATE GASOLINE VEHICLE IN AN ENCLOSED AREA WITHOUT PROPER VENTI-LATION. GASOLINE ENGINES PRODUCE CARBON MONOXIDE GAS, WHICH IS AN ODOR-LESS, DEADLY POISON.

- DO NOT MODIFY OR CHANGE THE VEHICLE IN ANY WAY WHICH MIGHT AFFECT ITS STABIL-ITY OR HANDLING, OR INCREASE MAXIMUM VEHICLE SPEED BEYOND FACTORY SPECIFI-CATIONS. PROPERTY DAMAGE, PERSONAL INJURY, OR DEATH COULD RESULT.
- DO NOT SHIFT THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE WHILE THE VEHICLE IS MOVING. TO AVOID INJURY TO PASSENGER(S) OR DAMAGE TO THE VEHICLE, ALWAYS BRING THE VEHICLE TO A FULL STOP BEFORE SHIFTING THE HANDLE. A BUZZER WILL SOUND AS A WARN-ING WHEN THE VEHICLE IS IN **REVERSE**.
- RELEASE THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL AND THEN DEPRESS THE BRAKE PEDAL FIRMLY UNTIL THE VEHICLE STOPS. TO AVOID UNINTENTIONALLY STARTING OR ROLLING THE VEHICLE, SET THE PARK BRAKE, TURN THE KEY SWITCH TO **OFF**, AND REMOVE THE KEY WHEN LEAVING THE VEHICLE.

KEY SWITCH

The key switch is mounted on the dash to the right of the steering column (Figure 4). It has two positions, OFF and ON, which are clearly labeled.

NOTE

• THE KEY CAN BE REMOVED WHEN THE KEY SWITCH IS IN THE OFF POSITION ONLY.

FORWARD/REVERSE CONTROL

The Forward/Reverse shift handle is located on the seat support panel, below and to the right of the driver's right knee (Figure 5, Page 17). The handle has three distinct positions: F (forward), N (neutral), and R (reverse). Rotate the handle towards the driver, F (forward), to operate the vehicle in the FORWARD direction, or towards the passenger, R (reverse), to operate the vehicle in REVERSE. When the handle is in the straight up, or N (neutral) position, the vehicle will not operate. The engine in a gasoline powered Tourall will shut down if the vehicle is shifted to NEUTRAL while the engine is running. All Club Car transportation vehicles operate at reduced speed in REVERSE.

NOTE

• THE REVERSE BUZZER(S) WILL SOUND AS A WARNING WHEN THE VEHICLE IS IN REVERSE.

Tourall Electric Vehicles with PowerDrive Plus (Motor Braking)

The Forward/Reverse switch shifter is located on the seat support panel below and to the right of the driver's right knee (**Figure 6**). The FORWARD (**F**) and REVERSE (**R**) positions are clearly marked on the switch. Push down the (**F**) side of the switch to operate the vehicle in the FORWARD direction, or push down on the (**R**) side of the switch to operate the vehicle in REVERSE. When neither side is depressed, the vehicle is in the NEUTRAL position and will not operate if the accelerator pedal depressed.

ACCELERATOR PEDAL

The accelerator pedal is the pedal on the right, with the word GO molded into it (Figure 7).

NOTE

- THE OPERATION OF THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL DIFFERS FROM THAT OF AN AUTOMO-BILE. WHEN THE KEY SWITCH IS ON, AND THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE IS IN EITHER FORWARD OR REVERSE, DEPRESSING THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL WILL AUTOMATICALLY RELEASE THE PARK BRAKE AND START THE VEHICLE MOVING IN THE DIRECTION SELECTED (FORWARD OR REVERSE). AS THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL IS DEPRESSED, SPEED WILL INCREASE UNTIL FULL SPEED IS REACHED. WHEN THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL IS RELEASED, POWER WILL BE CUT OFF AND THE ENGINE OR MOTOR WILL STOP RUN-NING.
- TOURALL ELECTRIC VEHICLES WITH POWERDRIVE PLUS (MOTOR BRAKING): SEE PEDAL UP AND PEDAL DOWN MOTOR BRAKING ON PAGE 16.

BRAKE PEDAL

The brake pedal is the large pedal on the left with the word **STOP** molded into it (Figure 7). To slow or stop the vehicle, depress the brake pedal with your foot.

PARK BRAKE PEDAL

The park brake pedal is the small raised portion in the upper left corner of the brake pedal. It has the word **PARK** molded into it and the words **PARK BRAKE** marked on top (Figure 7). To set the park brake, depress the brake pedal firmly and tilt the park brake portion of the pedal forward (Figure 9).

A WARNING

• THE PARK BRAKE WILL RELEASE AUTOMATICALLY WHEN EITHER THE ACCELERATOR OR BRAKE PEDAL IS DEPRESSED. THE PARK BRAKE HAS MULTIPLE LOCKING POSITIONS AND SHOULD BE FIRMLY PRESSED AND LOCKED TO PREVENT THE VEHICLE FROM ROLLING.



GASOLINE VEHICLES ONLY:

Neutral Lock-out

The gasoline vehicle has a neutral lock-out circuit that prevents the driver from starting the vehicle in NEUTRAL. If the vehicle is started in FORWARD or REVERSE and then shifted to NEUTRAL, the engine will stop running.

Neutral Lock-out, Continued:

For the convenience of the trained mechanic, there is a neutral lock-out cam (yellow knob) located on the back of the Forward/Reverse shifter, inside the engine compartment. If the neutral lock-out cam is pulled out approximately 3/8 inch (10 millimeters) and then rotated one-half turn until it snaps into place, the cam will be in the SERVICE position (Figure 10, Page 19). This will allow the mechanic to run the engine in NEUTRAL for certain maintenance procedures. With the cam in this position, the vehicle will not operate if the Forward/ Reverse handle is placed in either the FORWARD or REVERSE position. To put the cam back into the OPERATE position, pull the cam out approximately 3/8 inch (10 millimeters) and rotate it one-half turn until it snaps into place (Figure 11, Page 19). See WARNING and NOTE below.

A WARNING

• WITH THE CAM IN THE SERVICE POSITION AND THE ENGINE RUNNING, THE VEHICLE MAY MOVE SUDDENLY IF THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE IS SHIFTED OR ACCIDENTALLY BUMPED. TO PREVENT THIS, CHOCK THE FRONT AND REAR WHEELS AND ALWAYS FIRMLY SET THE PARK BRAKE BEFORE SERVICING OR LEAVING THE VEHICLE.

NOTE

• BE SURE TO RETURN THE CAM TO THE **OPERATE** POSITION AFTER SERVICING THE VEHI-CLE, OR THE VEHICLE WILL NOT RUN.

Choke

The choke is located on the seat support panel below and to the left of the driver's left knee (Figure 12). If the vehicle is hard to start in cool or cold temperatures, activate the choke by depressing the choke cover. Hold choke cover in during start up and release it after the engine starts and runs smoothly.

Oil Light

The gasoline powered vehicle is equipped with a low oil warning light, located on the dash panel just above the steering column (Figure 13). If the oil warning light comes on, oil should be checked and added to the engine as necessary before continuing to use the vehicle. The vehicle should never be driven when the oil warning light remains on. If the oil warning light goes on and off, the vehicle may be driven, but oil should be added at the first opportunity. If the oil level is correct and the light stays on, have a trained mechanic check the vehicle. See CAUTION top of page 21.

• FAILURE TO ADD OIL IMMEDIATELY WHEN THE OIL WARNING LIGHT STAYS ON MAY RESULT IN PERMANENT ENGINE DAMAGE.

ELECTRIC VEHICLES ONLY:

Battery Warning Light

PowerDrive System 48 and PowerDrive Plus vehicles, including all electric Trans-Porter/Trans-Sender, Resort Villager, and Tourall models, feature a dash mounted warning light (above steering column) that, when the vehicle is in operation, indicates low battery voltage, or, when the vehicle is being charged, indicates a charging problem. The battery warning light is controlled by the PowerDrive on-board computer. When the vehicle is in operation, the warning light will come on and remain illuminated if:

- Batteries voltage drops below 48 when there is no load on the batteries (the vehicle is stopped and there are no accessories on).
- Batteries have discharged to less than 25% of rated capacity.

If the warning light comes on when the vehicle is operating, there will be enough power remaining to drive the vehicle for approximately 30 minutes. However, the vehicle should be charged at the first opportunity. If the warning light comes on and the vehicle is unable to operate for 30 minutes, have your Club Car distributor/ dealer check the vehicle for a possible battery or electrical system problem.

When the batteries receive an incomplete charge because 1) the DC power cord is disconnected, 2) AC power to the charger is interrupted, 3) automatic charger shut-off occurs after 16 hours of operation, or 4) the charger malfunctions, the warning light will indicate as follows:

- The warning light will not come on if the charge is 90% or more complete. The on-board computer will retain in memory the amount of charge needed to fully replenish the batteries and will complete the charge during the next charge cycle.
- When the charger is unplugged, the warning light will come on and remain illuminated for 10 seconds if the charge is less than 90% complete but the vehicle has enough power for approximately 30 minutes of operation. This will alert the operator that the vehicle may be used, but that it must be charged to completion as soon as possible.
- The warning light will repeatedly illuminate for 10 seconds, with 4 second intervals if the charger times out at 16 hours and the batteries are not sufficiently charged (see PowerDrive Charger Owner's Manual). This indicates an abnormal charge cycle. The charger and batteries should be checked by your Club Car distributor/dealer.
- The warning light will repeatedly illuminate for 10 seconds, with 4 second intervals during a charge cycle (DC plug is still connected) if AC power to the charger is interrupted. The light will go out when AC power is restored.

TOURALL ELECTRIC VEHICLE WITH POWERDRIVE PLUS (MOTOR BRAKING) ONLY:

Tow/Run Switch:

- TO AVOID POSSIBLE BATTERY EXPLOSION, THE TOW/RUN SWITCH MUST BE IN THE **TOW** POSITION BEFORE DISCONNECTING OR CONNECTING BATTERY WIRES.
- WHEN THE TOW/RUN SWITCH IS IN THE **TOW** POSITION, ALL MOTOR BRAKING FUNCTIONS, INCLUDING ZERO-SPEED DETECT, ARE DISABLED.

The Tourall electric vehicle with PowerDrive Plus (motor braking) is equipped with a TOW/RUN switch, located under the seat just above the Forward/Reverse switch (Figure 14). The TOW/RUN switch must be in the RUN position in order to operate the vehicle. When the switch is in the TOW position, power to the vehicle electrical components is turned off and the vehicle will not operate.

The TOW/RUN switch should be placed in the TOW position under the following conditions:

- Before Towing the vehicle Place the TOW/RUN switch in the TOW position to disable all motor braking functions. This will prevent possible damage to the vehicle or electrical components.
- Before Connecting or Disconnecting Battery Wires Place the TOW/RUN switch in the TOW position to turn off power to the vehicle electrical system. This will prevent severe arcing and possible battery explosion as battery wires are connected or disconnected.
- For Long Term Storage Place the TOW/RUN switch in the TOW position to turn off power to the vehicle electrical system. This will prevent the electrical components from discharging the batteries.

STOPPING THE VEHICLE

- Tourall PowerDrive Plus Vehicle (Motor Braking) Only: When the vehicle TOW/RUN switch is in the RUN position, the *zero speed detect* function will prevent the vehicle from rolling at more than 1 or 2 mph unless the accelerator is depressed. This prevents the possibility of a parked vehicle (with park brake disengaged) rolling away too fast to be overtaken on foot. See Zero Speed Detect, Page 16.

KEY SWITCH

The key switch is mounted on the dash to the right of the steering column (Figure 15, Page 26). It has three positions, OFF, ON, and START, which are clearly labeled.

NOTE

• THE KEY CAN BE REMOVED WHEN THE KEY SWITCH IS IN THE **OFF** POSITION ONLY.

To start the vehicle, turn the key past the ON position to the START position and hold until the engine is running smoothly. Release the key and it will return to the ON position and the engine should idle.

FORWARD/REVERSE CONTROL

The Forward/Reverse handle is located on the seat support panel below and to the right of the driver's right knee (Figure 16, Page 26). The handle has three distinct positions: F (forward), N (neutral), and R (reverse). Rotate the handle towards the driver, F (forward), to operate the vehicle in the FORWARD direction, or towards the passenger, R (reverse), to operate the vehicle in REVERSE. When the handle is in the straight up, or N (neutral) position, the vehicle will idle. See NOTE below.

NOTE

- THE ENGINE WILL STOP RUNNING IF THE ACCELERATOR IS DEPRESSED WHILE THE FOR-WARD/REVERSE HANDLE IS IN THE **NEUTRAL** POSITION.
- THE REVERSE BUZZER WILL SOUND AS A WARNING WHEN THE VEHICLE IS IN **REVERSE**.

ACCELERATOR PEDAL

The accelerator pedal is the pedal on the right, with the word **GO** molded into it (Figure 18). See NOTE below.

NOTE

• THE OPERATION OF THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL DIFFERS FROM THAT OF AN AUTOMO-BILE. WHEN THE ENGINE IS RUNNING, AND THE SHIFT HANDLE IS IN EITHER FORWARD OR REVERSE, DEPRESSING THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL WILL AUTOMATICALLY RELEASE THE PARK BRAKE AND START THE VEHICLE MOVING IN THE SELECTED DIRECTION (FORWARD OR REVERSE). AS THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL IS DEPRESSED, SPEED WILL INCREASE UNTIL FULL SPEED IS REACHED. WHEN THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL IS RELEASED, IT WILL RETURN TO THE ORIGINAL POSITION AND THE ENGINE WILL DROP BACK TO IDLE.

BRAKE PEDAL

The brake pedal is the large pedal on the left with the word **STOP** molded into it (Figure 17). To slow or stop the vehicle, depress the brake pedal with your right foot.

A WARNING

• THE PARK BRAKE WILL RELEASE AUTOMATICALLY WHEN EITHER THE ACCELERATOR OR BRAKE PEDAL IS DEPRESSED. THE PARK BRAKE HAS MULTIPLE LOCKING POSITIONS AND SHOULD BE FIRMLY PRESSED TO PREVENT THE VEHICLE FROM ROLLING.

PARK BRAKE PEDAL

The park brake pedal is the small raised portion in the upper left corner of the brake pedal. It has the word **PARK** molded into it and the words **PARK BRAKE** marked on top of it (Figure 18). To set park brake, depress the brake pedal firmly and tilt the park brake portion of the pedal forward with your foot (Figure 19).

The park brake will release when either the brake pedal or accelerator pedal is depressed.

NEUTRAL LOCK-OUT

For the convenience of the trained mechanic, there is a neutral lock-out cam (yellow knob) located on the back of the Forward/Reverse shifter inside the engine compartment. If the neutral lock-out cam is pulled out approximately 3/8 inch (10 millimeters) and then rotated one-half turn until it snaps into place, the cam will be in the SERVICE position (Figure 20, Page 28). This will allow the mechanic to run the engine for certain maintenance procedures. With the cam in this position, the vehicle will not operate if the Forward/Reverse

handle is placed in either the FORWARD or REVERSE position. To put the cam back into the OPERATE position, pull the cam out approximately 3/8 inch (10 millimeters) and rotate it one-half turn until it snaps into place (Figure 21, Page 28). See WARNING and NOTE below.

WARNING

• WITH THE CAM IN THE **SERVICE** POSITION AND THE ENGINE RUNNING, THE VEHICLE MAY MOVE SUDDENLY IF THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE IS SHIFTED OR ACCIDENTALLY BUMPED. TO PREVENT THIS, CHOCK THE FRONT AND REAR WHEELS AND ALWAYS FIRMLY SET THE PARK BRAKE BEFORE SERVICING OR LEAVING THE VEHICLE.

NOTE

• BE SURE TO RETURN THE CAM TO THE **OPERATE** POSITION AFTER SERVICING THE VEHI-CLE, OR IT WILL NOT RUN WITH THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE IN EITHER THE FOR-WARD OR REVERSE POSITION.



CHOKE

The choke is located on the seat support panel below and to the left of the driver's left knee. If the vehicle is hard to start in cool or cold temperatures, activate the choke. Pull out the choke handle to activate it. Push the handle back in when the engine begins to run smoothly (Figure 22, Page 28).

- DO NOT STAND IN FRONT OF OR BEHIND THE VEHICLE.
- DO NOT DRIVE WHILE UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL, DRUGS OR MEDICATIONS.
- OPERATOR MUST CONTROL VEHICLE SPEED WHEN GOING DOWNHILL.
- GASOLINE VEHICLE ONLY: DEPRESS THE BRAKE PEDAL AS NECESSARY AND DEPRESS THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL PARTIALLY WHEN DESCENDING A HILL. WITH THE ACCELERA-TOR PEDAL PARTIALLY DEPRESSED, THE GOVERNOR WILL CAUSE THE ENGINE TO ASSIST THE BRAKES IN CONTROLLING DOWNHILL SPEED.

STARTING THE VEHICLE

- 1. Be sure load is secure.
- 2. Be sure everyone is seated and holding onto seat handles or handrails. Driver should have both hands on the steering wheel.

Starting the Vehicle, Continued:

- 3. Read safety warnings located above pedals.
- 4. Place the Forward/Reverse handle in the NEUTRAL position. Make sure wheels are turned in desired direction and nothing is in your path.
- 5. Depress and hold the brake pedal. Turn the key all the way to the START position and release after the engine is started. The engine will idle.
- 6. While keeping the brake engaged, place the Forward/Reverse handle in desired position (F = forward or R = reverse).
- 7. Release the brake pedal completely, and then slowly depress the accelerator pedal. As the accelerator pedal is depressed, speed will increase until full speed is reached.

NOTE

• IF THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL IS DEPRESSED WHILE THE FORWARD/REVERSE HANDLE IS IN **NEUTRAL**, OR IF YOU TRY TO SHIFT FROM **FORWARD** TO **REVERSE** WHILE THE ACCEL-ERATOR PEDAL IS DEPRESSED, THE ENGINE WILL SHUT OFF. TO KEEP THE ENGINE RUN-NING, THE ACCELERATOR PEDAL MUST BE RELEASED COMPLETELY BEFORE SHIFTING THE VEHICLE TO **NEUTRAL** OR FROM **FORWARD** TO **REVERSE**.

STOPPING THE VEHICLE

- STORE GASOLINE IN AN APPROVED GASOLINE CONTAINER ONLY. STORE IN A WELL-VEN-TILATED AREA AWAY FROM SPARKS, OPEN FLAMES, HEATERS, OR HEAT SOURCES.
- DO NOT SERVICE, REPAIR, OR OPERATE IN AN ENCLOSED AREA WITHOUT PROPER VEN-TILATION. THE ENGINE PRODUCES CARBON MONOXIDE WHICH IS AN ODORLESS, DEADLY POISON.

- 3. Drain carburetor and seal the fuel tank.
 - 3.1. Place the Forward/Reverse handle in the NEUTRAL position and the neutral lock-out cam in the SERVICE position. Turn the fuel shut-off valve to the OFF position and run the engine until fuel remaining in the carburetor and fuel lines is used up and the engine stalls. Return the neutral lock-out cam to the OPERATE position.
 - 3.2. Loosen (do not remove) the carburetor drain screw and drain fuel remaining in bowl into a small container, then pour the fuel from the container into vehicle fuel tank.
 - 3.3. Disconnect fuel vent line from fuel tank vent nipple.
 - 3.4. Plug the fuel tank vent nipple so that it is air tight. Club Car recommends using a slip-on vinyl cap.
- 4. To protect the engine, remove the spark plug and pour 1/2 ounce SAE 10 weight oil into the engine through the spark plug hole. Rotate the engine crank shaft several times and then re-install the spark plug.
- 5. Inflate tires to rated capacities (See Tire Capacities, Page 44).
- 6. Grease front suspension and do all quarterly periodic lubrication (See Periodic Lubrication Schedule, Page 42).
- 7. Thoroughly clean front body, rear body, seats, cargo bed, engine compartment, and underside of vehicle.
- 8. Do not latch the park brake. Chock wheels to prevent the vehicle from rolling.

TO RETURN THE STORED VEHICLE TO SERVICE:

- 1. Restore fuel system to operation.
 - 1.1. Remove plug from the fuel tank vent nipple and reconnect fuel vent line to nipple. Open the fuel shut-off valve.
 - 1.2. Place the Forward/Reverse handle in the NEUTRAL position and the neutral lock-out cam in the SERVICE position. Crank the engine until fuel is pumped into the carburetor and fuel lines and the engine starts. Turn the engine off and return the neutral lock-out cam to the **OPERATE** position.
- 2. Readjust tire pressure (See Tire Capacities, Page 44).
- 3. Perform the Pre-Operation Checklist (See pages 15 and 16).

NOTE

• WHEN STARTING THE ENGINE FOR THE FIRST TIME AFTER IT HAS BEEN STORED, IT MAY SMOKE EXCESSIVELY FOR A SHORT WHILE. THIS IS DUE TO THE OIL THAT WAS ADDED TO THE ENGINE TO PREPARE IT FOR STORAGE.

STORAGE - ELECTRIC VEHICLE

WARNING

- TURN THE KEY SWITCH **OFF**, REMOVE THE KEY, AND LEAVE THE FORWARD/REVERSE HAN-DLE IN THE **NEUTRAL** POSITION DURING STORAGE. THIS IS TO PREVENT UNINTENTION-ALLY STARTING THE VEHICLE.
- **POWERDRIVE PLUS VEHICLES WITH MOTOR BRAKING ONLY:** PLACE TOW SWITCH IN THE **TOW** POSITION.

- 7. Thoroughly clean front body, rear body, seats, cargo bed, battery compartment, and underside of the vehicle.
- 8. Do not latch the park brake. Block tires to prevent the vehicle from rolling.
- 9. Leave PowerDrive System 48 vehicles with PowerDrive chargers plugged in during storage. The PowerDrive storage charge feature will automatically charge the batteries as needed (See Batteries Electric Vehicle, Page 47).

MAINTENANCE

GENERAL INFORMATION:

To ensure trouble-free vehicle performance, it is very important to follow an established preventive maintenance program. Regular and consistent vehicle maintenance can prevent vehicle down-time and expensive repairs that result from neglect. Any vehicle not functioning correctly should be removed from use until it is properly repaired. This will prevent further damage to the vehicle and avoid the possibility of injury due to unsafe conditions. Contact your local Club Car distributor/dealer to perform all repairs and semi-annual and annual periodic service.

ENGINE OIL - GASOLINE VEHICLE

Even though the oil warning light on the dash should warn you if your oil is getting low, engine oil level should be checked monthly (Figure 29).

NOTE

• TO CHECK ENGINE OIL, THE ENGINE MUST BE IN A LEVEL POSITION. REMOVE THE OIL LEVEL DIPSTICK FROM THE OIL FILLER TUBE AND WIPE OIL FROM STICK. CHECK OIL BY FULLY INSERTING THE DIPSTICK INTO THE OIL FILLER TUBE AND IMMEDIATELY REMOVING IT AGAIN. The gasoline vehicle battery is a 12 volt, low maintenance battery that requires infrequent watering (Figure 32).

Any corrosion around the positive (+) or negative (-) terminals should be washed off with a solution of baking soda and water (1 cup per gallon of water), and then the baking soda solution rinsed off the battery. Do not allow the solution to get into the battery. Be sure terminals are tight. Let the terminals dry and then spray them with CLUB CAR battery terminal spray (Club Car Part No.1014305). **See WARNING on page 46 and CAUTION below.**

A CAUTION

- DO NOT ALLOW BAKING SODA SOLUTION TO ENTER THE BATTERIES.
- IF BATTERY WIRE TERMINALS ARE DAMAGED OR CORRODED, THEY SHOULD BE REPLACED OR CLEANED AS NECESSARY. FAILURE TO DO SO MAY CAUSE THEM TO OVER-HEAT DURING OPERATION.

Be sure battery hold-down bracket is properly tightened. Torque to 10-13 ft.lbs. (13.6/17.6 N-m). A loose hold-down bracket may allow the battery to become damaged from vibration or jarring.

If battery appears weak, have it charged by a trained mechanic. The battery should never be left discharged any longer than absolutely necessary (do not leave battery discharged overnight).

The batteries in PowerDrive System 48 Electric Vehicles are 8 volt, deep cycle batteries, specially built for electric vehicle application. Automotive batteries should never be used.

New batteries will not deliver their full capabilities until they have been discharged and recharged 20 to 50 times. To obtain the maximum service life from new batteries, restrict vehicles with new batteries to one hour of operation between charges for the first two months the vehicle is in service. Batteries should be fully charged before first use of new vehicle, before first use of vehicle after storage, and before releasing vehicle for use each day.

BATTERY CARE

To keep batteries in good working condition, follow this maintenance program on a regular basis:

- The batteries should be kept clean and free of corrosion. Wash tops and terminals of batteries with a solution of baking soda and water (1 cup baking soda per gallon of water). Rinse solution off batteries (NOTE: Do not allow this solution to enter the battery). Be sure terminals are tight. Let the terminals dry and then spray them with CLUB CAR battery protector spray (Club Car Part No. 1014305).
- 2. The water level in the batteries should be checked weekly (See Figure 32, Page 47, for proper level). Add water only after charging unless the water level is below the top of the plates. In this case, add just enough water to cover the plates, charge and then check the level again. Never charge batteries if plates are exposed above water level. For best battery life, use only distilled water.

NOTE

- CLUB CAR RECOMMENDS USING A BATTERY WATERING GUN OR BOTTLE. THESE ARE AVAILABLE AT MANY AUTO PARTS DEALERS.
- 3. The hold-down straps should be tight enough so that the batteries do not move while the vehicle is in motion, but not so tight as to crack or buckle the battery case. Torque hold-down retaining nuts to 35-45 in.lbs. (4/5 N-m). The terminal connections should be clean and tight, and any worn insulation or frayed wires should be replaced. Torque battery terminals to 125-145 in.lbs. (14/16.4 N-m).

A CAUTION

- IF BATTERY WIRE TERMINALS ARE DAMAGED OR CORRODED, THEY SHOULD BE REPLACED OR CLEANED AS NECESSARY. FAILURE TO DO SO MAY CAUSE THEM TO OVER-HEAT DURING OPERATION.
- 4. After use, the batteries should be placed on charge. The batteries should never be left discharged any longer than absolutely necessary (do not leave batteries discharged overnight).

- NEVER PUSH OBJECTS OF ANY KIND INTO THE CHARGER THROUGH CABINET SLOTS. THEY MAY TOUCH DANGEROUS VOLTAGE POINTS OR CAUSE AN ELECTRICAL SHORT CIR-CUIT THAT COULD RESULT IN FIRE OR ELECTRICAL SHOCK.
- DO NOT CONNECT A STATIONARY CHARGER TO THE RECEPTACLE IF THE CHARGER CORD, PLUG, OR THE VEHICLE RECEPTACLE IS BROKEN, DAMAGED, OR DOES NOT MAKE A GOOD ELECTRICAL CONNECTION. FIRE OR PERSONAL INJURY CAN RESULT. HAVE A QUALIFIED TECHNICIAN REPAIR OR REPLACE DEFECTIVE PARTS IMMEDIATELY.

- PROVIDE ADEQUATE VENTILATION FOR THE CHARGER.
- INSTALL SURGE ARRESTORS ON INCOMING AC POWER LINES. SURGE ARRESTORS WILL HELP PROTECT ELECTRICAL/ELECTRONIC COMPONENTS IN THE CHARGER AND ON THE VEHICLE FROM ALL BUT DIRECT OR VERY CLOSE LIGHTNING STRIKES.

Each electric vehicle is supplied with either a fully automatic, external, battery charger (Tourall and Resort Villager) or fully automatic on-board charger (Trans-Porter/Trans-Sender) as standard equipment. The AC cord from the charger should be connected to a source capable of supplying 10 amperes minimum per charger.

The battery charger must be grounded to reduce the risk of electrical shock. The charger is equipped with an AC electric cord having an equipment-grounding conductor and a grounding type plug and is for use on a nominal 115 Volt 60 Hertz circuit, unless otherwise noted on the charger. The plug must be grounded to an appropriate dedicated receptacle that is properly installed and grounded in accordance with the National Electrical Code, ANSI/NFPA 70, and all local codes and ordinances.

NOTE

- BECAUSE THE **POWERDRIVE** CHARGER HAS A STORAGE CHARGE FEATURE THAT AUTO-MATICALLY CHECKS AND RECHARGES THE BATTERIES AS NECESSARY EVERY 15 DAYS, IT CAN REMAIN PLUGGED TO A POWERDRIVE VEHICLE THROUGHOUT THE STORAGE PERIOD.
- SHORTLY AFTER CHARGING HAS BEGUN, THE **POWERDRIVE** CHARGER WILL SHUT OFF IN ORDER TO RUN A SELF-DIAGNOSTIC PROGRAM (AMMETER WILL DROP TO 0). CHARGING WILL RESUME IN A FEW MOMENTS (AMMETER WILL RETURN TO CURRENT STATE OF CHARGE).

The use of an extension cord with the charger should be avoided. If an extension cord must be used, then only use a three conductor No. 12 AWG heavy duty cord with a ground conductor in good electrical condition. Keep cord as short as possible (no more than twelve feet). Position all cords so they will not be stepped on, tripped over, or otherwise subject to damage or stress.

The charging area must be well-ventilated. To prevent a build-up of explosive gas, the hydrogen level in the air must never exceed 2%. The total volume of air in an enclosed charging area must be changed at least five times per hour. Consult a local HVAC engineer. **See DANGER, page 47**.

TO CHARGE BATTERIES

NOTE

- WHEN TEMPERATURES FALL BELOW 65° F (18.3 C), BATTERIES CHARGED IN UNHEATED AREAS SHOULD BE PLACED ON CHARGE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AFTER USE. BATTERIES ARE WARMEST IMMEDIATELY AFTER USE, WHILE COLD BATTERIES REQUIRE MORE TIME TO FULLY CHARGE.
 - Tourall and Resort Villager (External charger):

Insert the charger AC plug into a dedicated AC receptacle that is properly grounded and wired in accordance with the National Electric Code, ANSI/NFPA 70, and all local codes and ordinances. Then insert the charger DC plug into the vehicle receptacle. The charger will activate two to ten seconds later (Figure 33, Page 52).

Trans-Porter/Trans-Sender (On-board charger):

Insert the on-board charger AC plug into a dedicated AC receptacle that is properly grounded and wired in accordance with the National Electric Code, ANSI/NFPA 70, and all local codes and ordinances. The charger will activate two to ten seconds later.

The **PowerDrive Charger** interacts with an on-board computer on the PowerDrive System 48 vehicle. The computer records the amount of energy consumed during vehicle use. While the charger is plugged in the vehicle's control circuit is locked out, preventing operation, as well as, subsequent damage to the charger and the vehicle.

Once the lock-out is actuated, the charger turns on. The on-board computer then records the amount of energy being returned to the batteries. When the amount of energy required to replenish the batteries is returned, the charger will shut off. The control circuit lock-out remains activated until the charger plug is disconnected from the vehicle.

Because of these unique features, **only PowerDrive System 48 vehicles are compatible with the Power-Drive Charger** (neither vehicles made by other manufacturers, nor other Club Car models are compatible).

As long as the charger is allowed to shut off by itself, the batteries will be fully charged. Overcharging and undercharging will normally be prevented

To Charge Batteries, Continued:.



Batteries should be put on charge even if they have been used for only a short period (10 minutes). The charger is automatic and will turn off when batteries are fully charged. If the charger does not seem to be operating properly, or if the batteries seem weak, contact your local CLUB CAR distributor/dealer.

Receptacle Fuse Link

As an additional feature to protect the batteries and charging circuit from an overload, the electric vehicle is equipped with a receptacle fuse link (Figure 35). If the charger does not come on when the vehicle is placed on charge, visually inspect the fuse link. See WARNING below.

WARNING

- IF THE RECEPTACLE FUSE LINK IS BLOWN, DETERMINE THE SOURCE OF THE PROBLEM AND CORRECT IT BEFORE REPLACING THE FUSE.
- NEVER MODIFY WIRING TO BY-PASS THE GREY SENSE LEAD FUSE (FIGURE 35).

CLEANING THE VEHICLE

The vehicle is equipped with an Armorflex® front body and either an Amorflex or all-aluminum rear body. Some models also have aluminum cargo beds. Use only mild dishwashing liquid soap with a sponge or soft cloth for normal cleaning. **See CAUTION top of page 53**.

• IF A PRESSURE WASHER IS USED, DO NOT EXCEED 500 PSI (3448 KPA). NOZZLE SHOULD BE SET TO WIDE ANGLE SPRAY.

Minor scratches or blemishes in either the Armorflex or aluminum body panels can be buffed out using most commercially available polishing compounds and polishes.

The seats of the vehicle will last longer with proper cleaning. Mild soap or detergent with a sponge or soft cloth for normal cleaning is recommended. For stubborn or imbedded dirt, a soft bristle brush may be used. Do not use harsh detergents or cleaning solvents on the front body or the seats.

Battery acid, fertilizers, tars, asphalt, creosote, paint, or chewing gum should be removed immediately to prevent possible stains. Use commercial automotive products because the finish on the vehicle is the same as the finish on today's automobiles.

VEHICLE CONTROLLER - ELECTRIC VEHICLE

Electric vehicles are equipped with Solid State Speed Controllers. In order to properly service and maintain the Solid State Speed Controller vehicle, it is necessary to understand the electrical circuitry and the functions of all components in the system. Therefore, if any repair or service is required, Club Car recommends that it be performed by an authorized Club Car distributor/dealer using CLUB CAR OEM parts.

ACCESSORIES AND OPTIONS

A complete line of optional equipment items and accessories is available. Contact your distributor/dealer for an Optional Equipment book. Care should be taken that these accessories and options are properly installed by trained technicians, and that they are used in the manner for which they were designed.

LIMITED WARRANTY FOR 1998 TRANSPORTATION AND UTILITY VEHI-CLES IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA

1. WARRANTY:

CLUB CAR, INC. ("CLUB CAR") hereby warrants to the original retail purchaser that its new 1998 Model Transportation or Utility vehicle purchased from CLUB CAR or an authorized Transportation/Utility Vehicle dealer for use in the United States or Canada shall be free from defects in materials and workmanship under normal use and service as a transportation/utility vehicle for the periods stated below, subject to the provisions, limitations and exclusions contained in this limited warranty.

LIMITED TWO (2) YEAR / 2000 HOUR WARRANTY:

The engine assembly, unitized transaxle assembly (gasoline vehicle), motor, transaxle assembly (electric vehicle), main frame assembly, hydraulic dump kit, Custom Cab assembly and doors, and Driving Range Protective Enclosure are warranted with respect to parts and labor against defects in materials and work-manship for a period of two years from the date of purchase, or for 2000 hours of operation; whichever occurs first.

LIMITED ONE (1) YEAR / 1000 HOUR WARRANTY:

All remaining components of the vehicle not specified otherwise, the Portable Refreshment Center, and all other optional equipment and accessories are warranted with respect to parts and labor against defects in materials and workmanship for a period of one year from the date of purchase, or for 1000 hours of operation; whichever occurs first.

This limited warranty covers materials, workmanship and repair labor cost as to those items specifically listed above for the periods specified. Such repair labor shall be performed only by CLUB CAR, its authorized dealers, or a service agency approved by CLUB CAR.

IF THE WARRANTY REGISTRATION FORM IS NOT COMPLETED AND RETURNED TO CLUB CAR AT THE TIME OF THE ORIGINAL RETAIL SALE, PURCHASER MUST PROVIDE PROOF OF DATE OF PUR-CHASE WITH ANY WARRANTY CLAIM.

2. EXCLUSIONS:

Excluded from any Transportation/Utility vehicle warranty are all fuses, filters, decals (except safety decals), spark plugs, lubricants, trim pieces, seats, routine wear items such as the charger plug and receptacle, brake shoes, belts, brushes, bushings, light bulbs, mats and pads, maintenance adjustments, cosmetic deterioration, and items which deteriorate or fail due to exposure or ordinary wear and tear. Batteries, the battery charger, on-board computer, and solid-state speed controller are covered under separate CLUB CAR warranties. Tires are warranted by their manufacturer. Also excluded from any Transportation/Utility warranty is damage to a vehicle or component resulting from a cause other than a defect including unreasonable or unintended strain or use, improper installation of accessories, installation of parts or accessories that are not original equipment, overloading, accident, alteration, abuse or neglect.

Transportation expenses for warranty service are also excluded from this warranty.

3. VOIDING OF WARRANTY:

THIS AND ANY OTHER WARRANTY SHALL BE VOID IF THE VEHICLE IS ABUSED OR USED IN AN UNINTENDED MANNER OR SHOWS INDICATIONS THAT IT HAS BEEN ALTERED IN ANY WAY, INCLUD-ING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, MODIFICATION OF THE SPEED GOVERNOR, BRAKING SYSTEM, STEER-ING, TRANSAXLE, OR OTHER OPERATING SYSTEMS OF THE VEHICLE TO CAUSE IT TO PERFORM OUTSIDE CLUB CAR SPECIFICATIONS. THE WARRANTY IS LIKEWISE VOID IF THE VEHICLE SHOWS INDICATIONS THAT REASONABLE OR NECESSARY MAINTENANCE AS OUTLINED IN THE OWNER'S MANUAL AND MAINTENANCE AND SERVICE MANUAL WAS NOT PERFORMED AT THE TIME AND IN THE MANNER SPECIFIED IN SUCH MANUALS.

4. SOLE REMEDY:

CLUB CAR'S ONLY LIABILITY UNDER THIS LIMITED WARRANTY, OR IN ANY ACTION WHETHER BASED UPON WARRANTY, CONTRACT, NEGLIGENCE, STRICT PRODUCT LIABILITY OR OTHER-WISE, IS LIMITED TO THE REPAIR OR REPLACEMENT, AT CLUB CAR'S OPTION, OF A VEHICLE OR COMPONENT THEREOF THAT CLUB CAR DEEMS TO BE DEFECTIVE. REPLACEMENT SHALL MEAN FURNISHING, DURING THE APPLICABLE LIMITED WARRANTY PERIOD, A NEW VEHICLE OR FAC-TORY RECONDITIONED VEHICLE OR COMPONENT THEREOF WHICH IS IDENTICAL OR REASON-ABLY EQUIVALENT TO THE WARRANTED PRODUCT OR COMPONENT AT NO COST TO THE PURCHASER.
